HIGHLIGHTING NEW VISUAL FINDS

A recent GoFundMe campaign helped SASH acquire licensing rights from the Swedish Film Institute for film footage from some of the earliest overseas tours by the U.S. men's national team and Bethlehem Steel FC. The organization is indebted to everyone who contributed toward helping unearth and bring to light some of these long-lost highlights from American soccer history. Here is information about those videos as well as another gem featuring the Fall River Marksmen unearthed in the archives of the National Film Institute Hungary.



USMNT vs. Tigrarna Fotbollkubben Stockholm, Sweden August 15, 1916

This 80-second clip shows the U.S. men's national team in action against Stockholm-based club Tigrarna Fotbollkubben. The match, which ended in a 1-1 draw, was the first of six played during its first official international tour, which took place August and

September 1916 in Sweden and Norway. The footage (and the following two videos) were discovered in the collection of the Swedish Film Institute in Stockholm and is from the Svenska Biografteaterns Veckorevy (Swedish Cinema Theater Weekly Review) newsreel series.



Bethlehem Steel FC vs. AIK Stockholm, Sweden August 10, 1919

This 108-second clip is the earliest known film footage of a US club soccer team playing overseas. Featuring footage from Bethlehem Steel on their 1919 Scandinavian tour, this clip shows action from the club's 2-2 draw against Stockholm side Allmänna

Idrottsklubben (AIK) at Stockholm Olympic Stadium.

HIGHGLIGHTING NEW VISUAL FINDS

Bethlehem Steel FC vs. Swedish Provinces

Stockholm, Sweden August 17, 1919

This 84-second clip of pregame and game action shows Bethlehem Steel playing at the Stockholm Olympic Stadium against a select Swedish Provinces team. This footage is from the third match of



Bethlehem Steel's 1919 Scandinavian tour, a match which the Pennsylvania side won 2-1 over their Swedish counterparts.

Fall River Marksmen vs. Ferencváros

Budapest, Hungary August 31, 1930

This 71-second clip shows the Fall River Marksmen in action in a 6-2 loss against Ferencváros at the Üllői úti Stadion in Budapest, Hungary. The footage is from Fall River's 1930 Central European tour where the Marksmen challenged clubs from Czechoslovakia,




Austria, and Hungary. This footage was found in the National Film Institute Hungary.

BEAU DURE BOOK TALK: August 7, 2020

Society secretary and session moderator Zach Bigalke sat down with longtime soccer journalist Beau Dure in our First Friday SASH Session for August to talk about Dure's latest book, 2012: The Year that Saved Women's Soccer. Produced during the pandemic, 2012 is a chronicle and an oral history of the efforts to preserve opportunities for women to compete on the pitch in the year following the collapse of Women's Professional Soccer and preceding the launch of the National Women's Soccer League. After walked the audience through the longer history of professional women's soccer leagues in the United States, Dure and

Bigalke speak about the publication process before opening the discussion to audience questions.


GABE LOGAN BOOK TALK: October 2, 2020

Gabe Logan, professor of history at Northern Michigan University, joined the First Friday session in October to provide a photographic tour of Windy City soccer history with images from his book, *The Early Years of Chicago Soccer*, 1887-1939 (Lexington Books, 2019). The First Friday session for November featured a trio of club historians speaking about how they became involved with their work and what that work entails. David Kilpatrick, SASH board member and New York Cosmos historian, spoke about his long relationship with the historic club. Bob Gansler followed with his efforts to preserve the history of the Bavarian Soccer

Club in Milwaukee. Derek Goncalves concluded the presentations with his work on bringing the history of the Fall River Marksmen back to light. Following the presentations, the three historians answered questions from the audience.
