VLADISLAV BOGICEVIC
Midfielder. Retired from NASL in 1984.
Played seven seasons with the N.Y. Cosmos.
Played 47 full Internationals for Yugoslavia.
Won three NASL Championships.
Five-time NASL All-Star.



SHANNON HIGGINS Midfielder. Retired in 1991. Played 51 full Internationals for the U.S. Won 1991 World Cup Gold.



AL TROST

Midfielder. Retired from NASL in 1979.
Played seven seasons with St. Louis Stars,
California Surf, and Seattle Sounders.
Played 14 full Internationals for the U.S.
Member of 1972 Olympic Team.



ANGELO DIBERNARDO

Midfielder. Retired from NASL in 1984. Played six seasons with Los Angeles Aztecs and N.Y.
Cosmos. Played 20 full Internationals for the U.S.
Member of 1984 Olympic Team.
Won one NASL Championship.

MARY HARVEY
Goalkeeper. Retired in 1996. Played five seasons in Germany and Sweden. Played 27 full Internationals for the U.S. Won 1991 World Cup Gold and 1996 Olympic Gold.



WOLFGANG SUHNHOLZ,
Midfielder, Retired from NASL in 1980. Played six seasons with
the Boston Minutenien, Toronto Metros, Las Vegas Otticksilver,
Los Angeles Aztecs, and Cafriornia Surf. NASL All Stat
in 1977, Won one NASL Championship.



HUJA MITIC
Forward, Rebred from NASL in 1978, Played nine seasons with Caldand Clippers, Dallas Tornado, and San Jose Eurthquakes. Played one full International for the U.S. Four-time NASL All-Star.

And... The Veteran Finalists

ADOLPH BACHMEIER

Bachmeier played fifteen full Internationals for the U.S. Between 1956 and 1974 he played seventeen seasons in the National Soccer League of Chicago for Schwaben and Kickers, and one season in the NASL for Chicago, During his NSL career he won a US Amateur Cup and a total of four NSL championships. He was a member of the U.S. team in Olympic qualifying in 1964.

NICK KRAT

Krat played 14 full nternationals for the U.S. From 1962 through 1974 he played in the National Soccer League of Chicago for the Ukranian Lions and Hansa; one season in the NASL for St. Louis, and one season in the National Professional Soccer League for Chicago. While with the Ukranian Lions he won two NSL championships.

ALEX McNAB

McNab played eight seasons in the American Soccer League for Boston Wonder Workers, Fall River Marksmen and New Bedford Whalers and five seasons in the St. Louis Soccer League for Stix, Baer and Fuller, Central Breweries and St. Louis Shamrocks. While with these teams between '24 and '37 he won 3 ASL championships and 3 St. Louis Soccer League championships. He also won a total of 6 US Open Cups as well as being twice runner-up.

PETER MILLAR

Millar played 13 full Internationals for the U.S. Between 1960 and '72 he played a total of 8 seasons with New York Inter and Boca luniors in the American Soccer League and Eastern Conference, and three seasons in the German American Soccer League of New York with New York Inter-Giuliana. He also played one season in the NASL with Baltimore. Millar was twice named MVP in the ASL

JOHN O'CONNELL

O'Connell played four full Internationals for the US. He played ten seasons in the American Soccer League for Brooklyn Wanderers, New York Americans and New York Hakoah. During the period 1946 - '56 he won both the ASL championship and U.S. Open Cups while with the New York Americans and was named MVP two years in a row.

FABRI SALCEDO

Salcedo played twelve seasons in the American Soccer League with Brooklyn Hispano and Philadelphia Americans, and two seasons in the National Soccer League of Chicago for Manhattan Beer. During the period 1934 - '48 he won ASL championships with both the Hispano and Philadelphia Americans, and won two US Open Cup with the Hispano. Salcedo was the leading goalscorer in the ASL in three different seasons.

BILL SHEPPELL

Sheppell played ten full Internationals for the US and was a member of the US Olympic team in 1952. During the period 1943 to 1954 he played four seasons with the Kearny Irish in the American Soccer League and seven seasons with the Newark Germans in the German American Soccer League.

How They Are Chosen

he Selection Committees are going to have a tough time selecting this year's Hall of Famers. They will be voting for one and possibly two Players, and one Veteran from a star-studded list of finalists. According to Will Lunn, President and CEO of the Hall of Fame, "Being elected to the Hall of Fame is the pinnacle of a player's career but just to be selected as one of the Finalists means

that the player has had an exceptional career."

A player may be elected in either the Player category or the Veterans category depending upon the length of time since retirement. Up to two Players and one Veteran may be elected annually.

The entire process starts with
The Society for American
Soccer History (SASH) which
develops Master Eligibility
Lists outlining the career accomplishments of those who meet the minimum criteria required for eligibility.

Player Category

For a player to be eligible in this category he or she must have been retired for at least 4 years, but for no more than 25 years. And the player must have appeared in at least 20 full international games for the USA, of which at least one must have been in a World Cup or World Cup Qualifying match. This 20-game requirement is reduced to 10 games if they were played prior to 1990 in recognition of the fact that fewer international matches were played pre-1990. Or the player must have played at least five seasons in a First Division US Professional League and won either the League Championship, the U.S. Open Cup or have been a League All-Star at least once.

STATES SOCCER FEDERATION HALL OF FAME

RECORD RECOR

The Master List is sent to a nine-member Screening Committee made up of individuals who are Hall of Famers, and/or coaches of the U.S. Men's and Women's National Teams. Each member submits his or her top 10 candidates, which are then consolidated to produce a Final Ballot. A Selection Committee consisting of members of the

sports media and the Screening Committee then votes on the Final Ballot. The candidate who receives the highest number of votes is elected, plus the next highest vote getter provided that individual receives at least 50% of the votes on ballots cast. Up to two players can be elected annually.

Veteran Category

For a player to be eligible in this category he or she must have been retired for at least 25 years. The criteria are similar to those of

the Player Category except that if retired after 1959 he or she must have played in at least 10 full international games for the USA. If the games were played prior to 1960 this requirement is reduced to 5 full international games. These reduced criteria recognize the fact that fewer international matches were played in the earlier eras.

The Master List is sent to the Selection Committee

consisting of twelve Hall of Famers. Each member votes for his or her top 5 candidates which are then consolidated for the Final Ballot. The candidate who receives the most votes on the Final Ballot is inducted with one Veteran being inducted annually.

Even though we were aware he had been unwell for some time, the passing of a family member is still a sorrowful event. Yes, we do consider each Hall of Famer as family, and although we have not met some of you we still find the loss of "one of our own" difficult.

We are very pleased that his son John named the National Soccer Hall of Fame as an organization to which donations could be made to honor his father's memory. We have been overwhelmed by the number of people who have donated to the Hall in Frenchy's honor. Over the last two months we have received contributions in his name from all over the country, totaling nearly \$3,000. We are honored to be the recipient of such a tribute and show of support for Frenchy Boulos.



PROFILE: WERNER ROTH



Then...

Werner was born on April 4, 1948 in Hanitch, Bosnia and immigrated to the USA in 1956. He lived in Brooklyn, graduating from Brooklyn Technical High School in 1966 and later earning a degree in Interior Design from Pratt Institute. In 1967 he became a U.S. citizen.

His soccer career started with the German Hungarians of the German American Soccer League where he worked his way up from the Under-14 team to the first team in the Major Division. These early days, playing in front of a few hundred spectators on the hard-pack field at Metropolitan Oval with chain link goal nets, were a far cry from his later glory-days with the New York Cosmos where he played in front of record crowds at Giant Stadium.

Werner signed with the Cosmos in 1972 at age 24 and was the leading American amidst a galaxy of international stars, which included PELÉ and BECKEN-BAUER. He also played alongside fellow Hall of Famer RICK DAVIS whom he introduced at Rick's induction in 2001. He was with the Cosmos from 1972 through 1979 when he was forced to retire due to a serious knee injury. The Cosmos won the NASL championship in 1972, '77 and '78 and Werner captained the team in the 1977 title game against Seattle. He played a total of 142 NASL games. He won his first cap against Mexico in 1972 and went on to represent the U.S. 15 times during his national team career, captaining the U.S. team through much of '73, '74 and '75. He later served as Co-Director of Scouting for the Cosmos.

Off the field Werner's activities have ranged from working in various capacities with the New York Special

Olympics and Special Olympics International, to playing the villain in the famous movie "Victory" which starred Sylvester Stallone and PELÉ. And he has served on more major U.S.S.F committees than you can count. He was also active in

the business world, providing management and marketing consulting services to a number of firms and involving himself in various businesses such

as soccer training camps and sportswear manufacturing. For several years he worked as an interior design project manager with Shelley Systems Inc.

Werner's latest enterprise is the start-up of a company called SoccerMastery

Programs which focuses on the development of physical, psychological, technical and tactical development of elite-players.

Werner, who is single, now lives in Northport, Long Island and is a devotee of sailing, kayaking and scuba diving. He was inducted into the National Soccer Hall of Fame in 1989.
