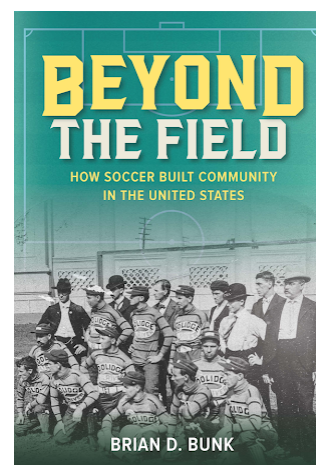
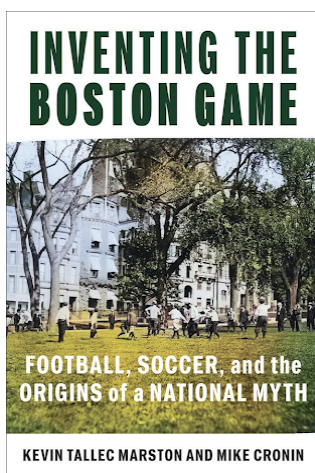

## SASH Members in Action





In January, Kevin Tallec Marston organized a launch event at Boston College for his new book (coauthored with Mike Cronin) *Inventing the Boston Game*. Thank you to former SASH board member and treasurer Brian D. Bunk who joined for a panel discussion.

The event included an exhibition featuring documents and artifacts from the FIFA Museum, Massachusetts Historical Society, Revolutionary Spaces, Noble and Greenough School, Historic New England, and the National Soccer Hall Of Fame.

James Brown worked with the family of SASH founder Sam Foulds and helped broker an agreement to transfer 17 boxes of material collected by Foulds to the National Soccer Hall of Fame (NSHOF) archive in North Carolina.

Brown also helped broker the transfer of an extensive collection of *Soccer America* issues from a private donor to the NSHOF archive in North Carolina.

SASH board member Chuck Carlson, along with Brown, worked with relatives of former USFA official Herb Choice to secure a box of box of memorabilia that includes USSF documents, photos, clippings and letters for transfer to the NSHOF archive in North Carolina.



In late January Carlson presented at the Independent Supporters Council conference in St. Paul, Minnesota. Over 200 committed soccer fans attended the conference, and Chuck's talk "Incorporating History Into Your Supporter Community: Thinking Globally Acting Locally" emphasized the importance of documenting community work done by supporter groups. He also recommended strategies for preserving and organizing records as well as using soccer to connect to wider community history.



Carlson has partnered with the Chicago Public Library Logan Square branch on the Back of the Net book club, a bi-monthly soccer themed book discussion group. Carlson also participated in a workshop organized by the CJ Foundation and Soccer Without Borders (photo above) focused on soccer coaching and violence prevention in Chicago.

With USL-side Rhode Island FC about to open its new stadium, *The Providence Journal* interviewed former SASH board member and treasurer Brian D. Bunk in February about the Watson Brothers, the first African American soccer players in the US, and soccer's long history in Rhode Island. Following former SASH board member Ed Farnsworth's discovery of the brothers, Farnsworth and Bunk were the first to write about the Watsons in an essay published on the SASH website in 2020. In 2023, Farnsworth and Bunk made a presentation to representatives of Rhode Island FC about the Watson Brothers and Pawtucket soccer history that was adapted for use on social media to help promote the new club, which made its USL debut in 2024.

Former SASH board member Jen Cooper was interviewed for an article about about the Women's United Soccer Association's (WUSA) Carolina Courage and North Carolina's deep legacy with women's soccer in the United States. The article, "The Place to Make History: The Triangle's deep legacy in women's soccer," was published on the NWSL's North Carolina Courage website.

SASH regularly fields research questions from people around the world through the SASH website and social media channels. Here's a list of recent queries:

- A university student in the UK looking for information about Liverpool's 1946 US tour for a podcast
- A high school student from New Hampshire who needed to interview a soccer historian for her senior project
- Someone looking for information about soccer in Detroit in the 1930s and 1940s in connection with his great grandfather, who played for the Bavarian Sports Club in the Detroit Amateur League
- A researcher interested in information about team colors in the first ASL
- Someone looking for information about a National Soccer League medal she inherited
- A university student from Maryland looking to interview someone about soccer in the US for their senior project
- A journalist working for NYC Tourism + Conventions preparing an article ahead of the 2026 World Cup highlighting the important role the AFA and the New York Metro Area had on the early history of soccer in the US
- A documentary filmmaker in North Carolina working on a film about a supporters group for the NC Courage and the history of women's soccer in North Carolina
- Following a request from the NSHOF, assisted family members of Walter Dick, a member of the US team at the 1934 World Cup, with information about Dick's career
- Following a request from the NSHOF, SASH is providing ongoing assistance to the National WWI Museum and Memorial in preparation for a forthcoming exhibit to be staged during the 2026 World Cup about soccer in the military during that conflict
- A public relations firm working on a landing page for the Go Providence website to help support the 2026 World Cup matches that will be played at Gillette Stadium contacted SASH for information and photographs related to early Rhode Island soccer history
- Someone looking for information about New Rochelle FC following the discovery of a photograph of the team from 1892
- A historian from Barcelona looking for information about the FC Barcelona match against the Jewish All-Star team selected from the Hakoah and Hatikvoh clubs during the Catalanian's 1937 US tour



## LA84 Foundation expands Soccer America collection

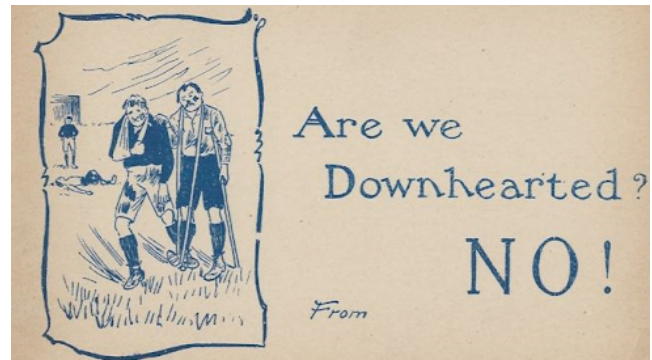
